WINTER PARKING

Effective November 1, Woodbury's winter parking restrictions became effective and remain until April 1, 2010. City ordinance prohibits onstreet parking between 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. or any time 2 or more inches of snow have accumulated until after the street has been completely plowed.

WINTER MAINTENANCE

A-1 Maintenance is our new service provider for snow removal and lawn care. Driveways and all obstructions have been marked with stakes for guidance and safety when plowing.

Winter maintenance specifications:

- Snow removal will occur when accumulation has reached at least 1.5 inches.
- Driveways will be initially opened to allow access prior to 7:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. when continuous snowfall accumulates to 4 inches.
- Driveways will be thoroughly cleaned within 8 hours of cessation of snow depths of 1.5" to 8", and within 12 hours of cessation for snow depths exceeding 8 inches.
- A snowfall lasting 24 hours or more with an accumulation of at least 1.5" will be cleared.
- Driveways that become closed by city plows will be opened near the street.
- Sidewalks will be cleared using the same guidelines, but may be delayed if wind chill factors reach 25 degrees below zero until safer conditions prevail.

TRASH & RECYCLING

Because Christmas and New Year's holidays both fall on Friday this year, trash/recycling collection days will be the usual Thursdays.

Interesting facts:

- Maroney's Sanitation partners with the Eureka Recycling organization that insures our materials really get recycled.
- By collecting materials in two "streams", (1) containers (cans, glass and plastic - types 1 and 2 only) and (2) papers/fibers (cardboard, magazines and junk mail), the quality is protected for manufacturers who choose which materials they buy to make new products.
- The slow economy affects recycling. Last July, Maroney's collected 270,340 pounds of newspaper and cardboard and received only \$99.50 for it.

Items not recyclable include:

Pizza boxes, egg cartons, frozen or refrigerated food boxes, paper cups, plates or napkins, soiled or food-contaminated paper, plastic types 3-7, plastic tubs (yogurt or margarine), plastic toys, styrofoam, aerosol cans, scrap metal, window glass, light bulbs, dishes, ceramics or cookware or bottles for hazardous materials.

Washington County's Environmental Center on Cottage Grove Drive south of Bailey Road is open for residential hazardous waste (household paints and chemicals). The center will also accept electronics including computer components, TVs, VCRs and DVDs.

Batteries that contain hazardous material and must be properly disposed of include:

- Automotive: car, motorcycle, golf cart, ATV, wheelchair, etc. (State law requires that stores selling automotive batteries must take them back at no charge.)
- Button type: greeting card, toy, hearing aid, watch, pager, calculator, etc.
- Rechargeable: cell phone, power tool, laptop, digital camera, MP3 player.

Non-rechargeable, alkaline batteries may be placed in your trash.

CREATE LESS WASTE

Between Thanksgiving and New Year's Day, we produce 25% more trash than at any other time of year. Much of this comes from boxes, wrapping paper, tissue, ribbons and bows used for gifts.

To reduce waste, give gifts in reusable gift bags or use newsprint instead of wrapping paper. Give non-material gifts such as a donation to a favorite charity. Send electronic holiday greetings instead of cards. Reuse ribbon, bows, tissue paper and wrapping paper that's still in good condition.

Remember, wrapping paper and tissue are NOT recyclable.
