With the 4th of July approaching, homeowners are reminded of the "Prohibition of Nuisance Activities" section of the bylaws. Be considerate of your neighbors' property, including the time of day when using legal fireworks. Consumer (legal) fireworks include sparklers, cones and tubes that emit sparks, and novelty items like snakes and party poppers, but

they must not be used on public property, i.e. city streets and parks.

Prohibited fireworks include firecrackers, bottle rockets, missiles, roman candles, mortars and shells.

### FRIENDLY REMINDERS

New residents may not be aware that trash and recycling bins must be stored out of sight (in your garage) except for trash collection days.

The City of Woodbury Solid Waste Ordinance states that containers may be placed at the end of the driveway after 6:00 p.m. on the day before collection.

- 1. City Ordinances require that all persons clean up after their pets or be cited for violating city code and fined. Parks maintenance crews are cleaning up problem areas along the trails but pet owners are asked to help keep the parks and trails clean.
- 2. Dispose of all expired and unused prescription drugs at the year-round collection boxes at either the Washington County Sheriff's Office in Stillwater or at the new Washington County Service Center location at 13000 Ravine Parkway South in Cottage Grove.

### GREAT TIPS!

- Put a small amount of water in a glass when you re-heat thick pizza crust in the microwave to keep it from getting too chewy.

### Heritage Glen Townhomes Tree Inventory Management Prioritization

MAP: Refers to the Map Number per tree

**Species**: Common names are given, not scientific names

**DBH**: Diameter at Breast Height (measured at 4.5 feet from the ground), in inches

**Condition**: 1 - Specimen Tree

2 - Good Condition3 - Fair Condition

4 - Poor Condition (likely dead or dying)

**Priority Rating**: Rated from 1 (recommend prompt action) to 4 (can wait, but do not forget about it!)

**Remove:** Remove whole tree. How soon depends on Priority Rating assigned. Marked with an "X" if recommended. In some cases, there may also be some recommended pruning, if needed to be done sooner than the removal.

**Pruning:** Refers to the recommended pruning activity per plant. It will have a *Pruning Level* (refers to the smallest branch that the pruning activity will encompass) followed by a *Pruning Objective* (refers to the objectives of the pruning activity)

Pruning Level: FT - Fine Thinning. Remove dead, diseased, broken, rubbing limbs and some

light overall thinning. Smallest branch is 0.5" (diameter)

MT - Medium Thinning. Same as above, but smallest limb is 1" (diameter) CT - Coarse Thinning. Same as above, but smallest limb is 2" (diameter)

Pruning Objective: CLR (clear the building or other permanent structure)

DW (deadwood pruning)

WEIGH (weight reduction pruning)

RAI (raise lowest branches to the recommended height)

HEALTH (concerns about health of the tree)

STRUCT (concerns about tree structure and architecture)

HAZARD (tree poses a high risk)

**Raise**: Prune up lowest branches to a specified height (in feet; it is approximate, based on individual branch architecture)

**Clear**: Prune branches away from a building or other permanent structure to a specified distance (in feet; it is approximate, based on individual branch architecture)

**Comments**: Tree-specific comments that are relevant to help explain a priority rating or other significant issues
