THE BOARD "TWEETS"

Due to a recent incident resulting in major water and ice damage from while frozen water pipes the homeowners were away for just $2\frac{1}{2}$ days, the Board would like to alert you to what can occur in a very short time in cold weather. Consider turning off supply your your water during absence, along with having a trusted friend or neighbor check your home daily.

SPRING REMINDERS

- 1. City of Woodbury Winter Parking rules end on April 1.
- Woodbury continues to install flashing yellow arrow traffic signals on city roads. Drivers are allowed to turn left after yielding to all oncoming traffic and any pedestrians in the crosswalk.

PICNIC DATE CHANGE

The Social Committee, with Board approval, will host our 2013 annual

Heritage Fest picnic this upcoming summer, rather than in the autumn.

Long-time residents will remember that for the first 3 years the picnic was held in July, in Woodduck Circle. The weather each time was extremely hot and the trees were too small to provide any appreciable shade. Now that our trees have matured, we have acquired two canopies which provide shade, and the event takes place in a "yard" rather than on the street, we will again schedule a summer picnic.

The date is not yet confirmed, but will be on a Saturday in June or July. Fliers with complete details will be delivered to your non-postal boxes well in advance of the picnic.

SIDEWALK SALT

When the temperature is above 5 degrees, homeowners should consider using **Magnesium Chloride** ice-melter on sidewalks to prevent ice buildup. Magnesium Chloride is considered to be the best total ice-melter; it is less corrosive on metal surfaces, protects concrete from spalling, is less toxic and environmentally as safe as Calcium Chloride, and much less corrosive than Sodium Chloride (rock salt). It is safer for use around humans, pets, and near vegetation.

The advantage of Calcium Chloride is that it will work to 25 degrees below zero. Both Magnesium and Calcium Chlorides are readily available locally and are similarly priced.

De-icers such as Ammonium Sulfate and Ammonium Nitrate are not recommended as they will chemically attack concrete, causing damage.

RECYCLING REMINDERS

Maroney's delivered the new single sort recycling carts in mid-January. Remember that:

- Recycling is now collected every <u>other</u> week - the "brown" week.
- PLACE THE RECYCLING CART AT LEAST ONE FOOT FROM YOUR TRASH BIN.
- All plastics #1 #7 are being recycled. Yogurt and margarine tubs, plastic produce baskets and clamshells from bakery goods are now accepted.
