We are currently trying to organize our Annual Meeting, either inside while socially distancing or by using a visual option. If you have any suggestions or ideas, contact any Board member promptly. LANDSCAPE MAINTENANCE PROJECTS

Our common grounds are seeing multiple projects being performed this summer:

^ Landscape edging repair or replacement is an ongoing project, due to ground heaving that occurs during freeze/thaw weather cycles.

^ Pruning of non-deciduous trees (except oak) which present an obstacle to our mowing crews, or are needed to clear limbs that are too near homes. ^ Removal of one dead pine tree and one linden that has roots likely unable to hold the tree upright through the winter.

^ Ash trees treated to prevent damage by emerald ash borer bugs. The trees are injected with a serum, expected to be effective for two years, then a metal tag is hung on each tree.

^ Repair of the metal irrigation controller boxes with a metal skirt installed around the bottom perimeter, wire brushing and painting.

Other projects under consideration:

^ Turf core aeration, which breaks up our heavy clay soil and allows for healthy grass rootings.

Addition of fabric berms to rain garden
#3, to slow the water movement and help prevent a stream of water flowing to Woodduck Drive.

^ Cutting back the invasive, nuisance buckthorn growth at the far north and south sides of our grounds.

MISINFORMATION?

Guess who decided reusable bags are unsafe during a pandemic?

My grocery store informed me that I'm not allowed to bring in reusable bags when I shop. I was told that the plastic bags it has at its checkout counters are more sanitary.

They got this misinformation from the Plastic Industry Association, which claims that reusable bags "carry viruses and bacteria" and will worsen this pandemic, citing a study funded by the American Chemistry Council, a trade group that represents fossil fuel and petroleum companies that produce plastic bags.

No evidence exists that disposable products are less likely to spread the virus than reusable ones. According to the New England Journal of Medicine, COVID-19 is most stable on plastic and other nonporous surfaces.

Time to be a skeptic. I bring in my own bags, and the grocery store no longer makes me leave them at the door.
